With deep regrets, we wish to announce the recent death of long time Chapter member Ken O'Loughlin. The Chapter extends their sincere sympathy and condolences to Ken's family.

Vale Ken O'Loughlin
25th May 1918 to 28th May 2010

Kenneth (Ken) James O'Loughlin was born on the 25th May 1918 in Thebarton, Adelaide to parents James and Mary. Ken had a tough childhood. As a young boy he was sent up to Hamilton to the O'Dea family to be a boy companion (read slave labourer). His schooling was through correspondence from the Hamilton school. Ken was also to help with feeding the horses and chopping wood and other duties as required.

Ken worked as a driver for a removals company in Adelaide and then through this company did his apprenticeship as a motor mechanic, working there till the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939. Ken joined the army in the 9th Div Cavalry. This division went to North Africa and Ken was part of the famous and heroic Rats Of Tobruk. Ken was a 'King's Driver' and as it turned out Princess Elizabeth, now Queen Elizabeth was also, as a part of her War effort, a driver in the North Africa campaign. Ken remembered the 'Fire for Effect' at El Alemain, where the order was given to keep firing the artillery shells during the key battle to push back Rommel and control North Africa for the Allies.

It was also during the War that he met the love of his life, Jean Haskett. On the 12th June 1944 Jean and Ken were married. The marriage was blessed with 2 sons Brian and Chris. That now has expanded to 9 grandchildren and 16 almost 17 great grand children.

When the War concluded Ken went to work for a farmer on the West Coast at Dark Peake as a driver/mechanic. Ken then went to work as a mechanic for O.M. & C. Eatts in Kimba, finally buying the shop where he began his work. They lived in Kimba until he retired at the age of 60.

Jean and Ken then moved to Hamilton for some 15 years where he restored cars and helped others with their car projects. Ken was always a mechanic at heart. At 91 he took the last car out of the shed because he couldn't see it.

Jean and Ken moved into Old Adelaide Road in Kapunda. In 1998 Jean passed away and Ken continued to live there until March of this year 2010 when he went into the Kapunda Homes. After about a month, Ken was hospitalised. Ken passed away peacefully in the Kapunda Hospital on the 28th May 2010 (3 days after his 92 birthday) with his family present. Ken is now at peace and at rest and reunited with his beloved Jean. He is sadly missed by all who knew and loved him.

End of Kapunda Chapter report

Goolwa Motor Museum

I recently visited this museum. It is well worth a visit as most of the cars there, although from the 50's, 60's and 70's era, are very rare.

There are about 40 cars and they are all owned by Michael Finnis who used to own Collectible Classics on South Road.

The rarest car would be a 1964 Zeta utility one of only 6 made and the only one surviving A they are a rare car. Other rare cars would be the 1934 Singer and a 1947 Allard tourer, the only one in Australia. There were three cars I had not seen examples of before. One was a 1959 Lloyd Alexander and the other was a Wills Thompson tourer of the late 50's. This was a kit car assembled in Adelaide and only 3 or 4 were ever made and it is the only one left in existence. The third was a 1974 DAF a Dutch made car that I had never heard of before. (*DAF 1958-1974 was bought out by Volvo in 1974 and this car went on to form the basis of a new model Volvo .. Ed.*)

Other vehicles uncommon in Australia include a 1950 Austin 90 Atlantic convertible, 1952 Austin A 40 tourer, 1935 Opel (the late Robert Greig from Spalding had one about 1938 and the late Roy Baker had one a Station wagon about 1964), 1950 Armstrong Siddeley convertible. a 1935 De Soto and a 1959 DKW.

There is a 1937 Oldsmobile (a saloon like I used to have) , a 1952 Packard, 1964 Goggomobil, a 1926 Morris Commercial and a 1974 Nikki made by Fiat and the same as one sold at the Geralka sale.

There were quite a lot of other cars there as well including 4 or 5 Jaguars several MG a couple of Rolls Royce, a Jensen and a Mercedes Benz all in the 50's and early 60's era There was also a display of miniature cars - toy models in 3 or 4 showcases an all different makes of cars.

He also had photos on the walls of sports cars and early racing cars as well as a lot of car magazines. Michael used to race cars at Mallala and he goes in the Adelaide classic car rally every year.

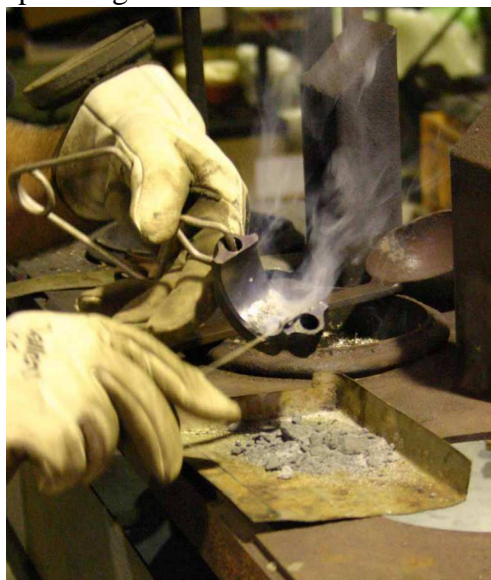
The April meeting was held at Goode Restorations in Clare.

David Kent and Graham Burgess from Burkent Vintage Engine Rebuilds, Port Pirie brought along their casting equipment to demonstrate the procedure for forming white metal bearings.

After about 15 minutes of heating the stock white metal reached 700 degrees Fahrenheit and was ready to pour. However it is first necessary to tin the parts. This is done by placing them in the molten metal to heat then spreading Allflux onto the desired surfaces

and then placing back into the molten metal briefly. A nice clean tinned surface should result. This was then washed to remove all traces of flux

The tinned big end was placed onto the casting block which had been heated to allow the metal to flow to all surfaces. The big end was puttied into place using a mixture of fire clay and flour! This is to prevent leakages and to ensure the metal stays where needed. This mixture was heated to set it. The workshop now smelt like a bakery.

The white metal was then poured.

Unfortunately they forgot to putty the oil hole in the con rod so only half of the bearing formed. Things always go wrong when you have a mob looking over your shoulder. The bearing cap was also done the same way.

They then showed us a video of how resultant bearings

are then machined on a purpose made double ended lathe.

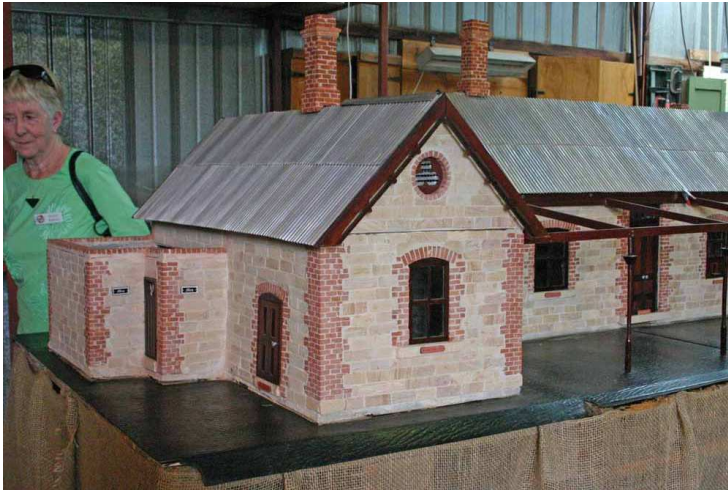

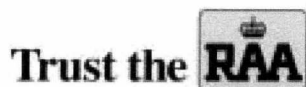
